
Introduction to the workshop agenda

1.2 Friday, 3rd of February






1.2.1 Interactive workshop 1: Current situation and future perspectives for living and working in the Alps










































After the lunch break **Toni Büchel** and **Sandra Fausch** took as on a tour around Schellenberg.




































At the end we learned it is better to take many small steps in the right direction than to make a great leap forward and get tired along the way.
